Originally serialized in the publication *Young Folks' Paper* in 1886 and published as a standalone book later that year, Kidnapped is a historical adventure novel set in the years following the Jacobite rising of 1745. 

Stevenson's book of children's rhymes and fairy tales, dedicated to his childhood nurse Alison Cunningham, who lay awake with him when he was sick. The first edition illustrated by Jessie Wilcox Smith, arguably the most famous American illustrator of children's books. Smith was famous for her ability to acutely capture the moods and expressions of children in her drawings. Wilcox Smith worked in the Golden Age of American illustration, completing work for Harper's, Collier's, Scribner's, Good Housekeeping, the Ladies Home Journal, and other magazines. Wilcox Smith trained under Howard Pyle at the Drexel Institute, and there met Elizabeth Shippen Green and Violet Oakley. Wilcox Smith would go on to form an artistic consortium with these women, all of whom achieved notoriety as American illustrators. Her illustrations gave life to tales like Mother Goose, Little Women, The Water Babies, and others. A lovely copy, replete with sensitive images of children and the child's powerful imagination. \$300



ADNB, Elizabeth Hawks, "Pyle, Howard". Over his 35-year career, Pyle carved a reputation for himself as one of America's most significant illustrators. He produced more than 3,000 illustrations for books and magazines, twenty books, and several articles. Pyle began as a children's book illustrator, and established new standards in American book -making with his designs, with William Morris among one of his numerous fans. Pyle was notably famous for his illustrations about pirates and historical adventure stories. He illustrated books by Robert Louis Stevenson, Oliver Wendell Holmes, and William Dean Howells. This book is a compilation of some of Pyle's work related to pirates and vividly demonstrates his style and his influential conception of pirate costume. An attractive example of this wonderfully illustrated book, decidedly uncommon in the dust jacket. \$1,350





A Very Good+ volume with minor foxing to the fore-edge and just a hint of rubbing to the corners of the boards. Oxford DNB, Charles H. Smith, "Wallace, Alfred Russel". Alfred Russel Wallace was both a biologist and a social scientist. This volume contains his defense of Darwin's Theory of Natural Selection, and an explanation of the theory for an educated public to read. This was and remains one of Wallace's most popular works. Wallace independently arrived at the Theory of Natural Selection twenty years after Darwin did. The two would go on to be friends, as Wallace notably used some of Darwin's notes for this publication (the notes, he states in his preface, came from Darwin's son). During his life Wallace traveled to the Malay peninsula and to the Amazon Rainforest to observe evidence of natural selection and species-level change. A scientific lecturer, a socialist, and a defender and colleague of Darwin, Wallace's book is an important work in the history of science. \$400



The present edition represents his thought at roughly the mid-point of this period (and was followed by new editions in 1998 and 2005). A very sharp copy of Gert's best-known and most influential work. \$60



Each section is introduced by an expert in the field who places Newton's writings in their historical and scientific context. 

Hardy is one of the greatest and most influential English mathematicians of the twentieth century, and Wright, one of his many students, was a notable mathematician working principally in number theory over the course of his long career. The Theory of Numbers was developed out of a course of lectures delivered by Hardy and Wright at their respective institutions (Cambridge and Aberdeen). The book has been viewed since its publication as the classic work in elementary number theory and is widely viewed as one of Hardy's three masterpieces. The Theory of Numbers is still in print (currently in its sixth edition) and remains in use in university courses on number theory. A very presentable copy of one of the milestones of twentieth-century mathematical exposition and quite uncommon in the first edition. **\$1,000**










The series as a whole was quite popular and widely admired for its literary style and engrossing historical narrative. 



The German text in this volume is largely that of *Philosophische Bemerkungen* with a few minor differences, whereas the English translation is new. Lapointe 8. This book captures Wittgenstein's thinking in the period from February 1929 to May 1930, and reflects many of Wittgenstein's conversations with the mathematician and philosopher F.P. Ramsey. Philosophical Remarks is a transitional work between the Tractatus and Philosophical Investigations and marks the beginning of his break with the views of the *Tractatus*. A sharp copy of this important book, indispensable for any study of the development of Wittgenstein's later philosophical views. \$200





Oxford DNB, Maurice Headlam and Ivor Thomas, "Heath, Sir Thomas Little". The Manual is a condensed version of Heath's two-volume History of Greek Mathematics. Heath's History of Greek Mathematics was his magnum opus, and is still regarded as the authoritative and definitive work on ancient Greek mathematics. Before Heath, little work had been done on Greek mathematics prior to Euclid. Heath was a pre-eminent classicist and helped to edit the ninth edition of Liddell and Scott's Greek-English Lexicon, adding several Greek mathematical terms to it. This volume is Heath's general overview of the development of mathematics in Ancient Greece intended for a reader educated in the Classics, but without an advanced knowledge of mathematics. An important work from a significant twentieth-century classical Greek scholar. **\$200**






represent the typical English country gentleman. Addison wrote vignettes featuring De Coverley
that were often thought of as The Spectator's best material. These vignettes focused on upperclass English life, manners, and social customs during the eighteenth century. \$100





Jeffrey is perhaps best known for his work in the Bayesian tradition, exploring the methodological foundations and applications of Bayesianism. In this influential book, Jeffrey develops a theory of subjective expected utility combining two functions, a utility function representing an agent's desires, and a probability function representing the agent's beliefs. Jeffrey proposes an axiomatization and proves a representation theorem. The book was written during Jeffrey's time as a visitor at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton. During this period, Jeffrey met weekly with mathematician Kurt Gödel who was quite influential in the writing of this book. A presentable copy of this well-known work in decision theory. \$75








He was stationed in Constantinople and in the Balkans for several years, and through this position he was able to travel to and write about Egypt. In this volume he presents a geographical summary of Egypt, and investigates its political systems. Wallace travels through the desert to different villages, cities, and communes, and records the daily life, the British influence, and the political realities of nineteenth-century Egypt. **\$200**



Parfit's magnum opus, a masterful exploration of the issue of personal identity and its implications for moral theory. Parfit espoused the "psychological continuity" view of personal identity: in order for a person P at a time t1 to be identical to a person Q at a time t2, P must be uniquely psychologically continuous with Q, that is, P's memories, intentions, beliefs, and desires at t1 must be in "an overlapping chain of strong psychological connectedness" with Q's memories, intentions, beliefs, and desires at t2 (Parfit 1984). The great significance and influence of this book rests upon Parfit's further claim that, in effect, identity doesn't matter, what matters is psychological continuity or connectedness (without any uniqueness requirement); in particular, Parfit contends that our survival is dependent only upon this psychological continuity or connectedness, not on personal identity. Parfit then explores the consequences of this view for moral theory and argues that this conception of the self has a significant impact on the concept of self-interest and prudence in regard to decision making about our later selves, with the latter becoming a matter of morality. The influence of this book cannot be overstated, and it has generated a vast literature since its publication. A beautiful copy of this landmark work in personal identity and ethics, exceedingly difficult to find. \$1,250



The book is based on a series of seven lectures delivered by Feynman at Cornell University in 1964. The lectures were recorded by the BBC and the book was issued as a companion piece to the broadcast. The lectures were focused on the laws of physics and Feynman discussed the Law of Gravitation, the mathematics behind the laws of physics, the nature of explanation, the principles of conservation and symmetry, and the notorious paradoxes of quantum physics. Herbrand is best known for two important results, the Herbrand theorem in classical logic and (one direction of) the Herbrand-Ribet theorem in class field theory. Herbrand's proof of the former result is included in this book (V. Investigations in Proof Theory (1930)) and is a well-known and significant theorem in mathematical logic (Herbrand shows that certain formulas in first-order logic are reducible to formulas in propositional logic in the sense a first-order formula of the right sort is valid just in case the propositional "translation" formula is valid). Although Herbrand's tragic death in the Alps at age 23 cut short his mathematical career, he nevertheless is an important figure in modern mathematics. **\$125**
