Minor wear to the boards' edges; jacket sunned on its spine panel with light edge wear. Inscribed by Crump on the half-title page to a Clyde Simpson. Stanford, The Martin Luther King, Jr. Research and Education Institute, "Watts Rebellion (Los Angeles): Event August 11, 1965 to August 16, 1965". The Watts Uprising was precipitated by police brutality and economic inequality, specifically, a lack




of quality jobs and housing. These factors hit the Watts area especially hard, as it was experiencing outsized population density and continued governmental neglect. The burnt and destroyed areas stretched for dozens of miles, and brought Martin Luther King Jr. to the city to assess the situation, the damage, and to try and act as an intermediary between the community and city officials. The event inspired a conversation between King and President Johnson, in which King requested that Johnson bring a federal program to Los Angeles to fight poverty. The photographs in this volume are visceral, raw, and portray a community in crisis as they contend with centuries of racial inequality and tension. \$350






some toning and sunning (to its spine panel) and a small dampspot on its reverse. A fierce feminist biography of Rosalind Franklin, who was one of four people responsible for discovering the molecular structure of DNA. Sayre writes that Watson's famous book, *The Double Helix*, greatly diminished and obscured Franklin's contributions to the monumental discovery, and her book sets out to correct this injustice. A fabulous history of the short but powerful life of Rosalind Franklin, with a history of sexism in twentieth-century science. \$300





The autobiography of the best-known leader of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, an organization that empowered women politically to advocate for female suffrage, raising the marriage age for girls, prison reforms, and of course, laws that prohibited the sale and distribution of alcohol. The Union boasted half a million dues paying members in the 1890's, and was a major social influence in the United States. The organization provided a voice for women, and a sort of autonomy outside the home to express themselves. Although Willard is remembered for growing the organization into a large one, her advocacy stopped short of full social reform, as she refused to support Ida B. Wells' anti-lynching campaign. Willard is also recorded as struggling with repressed homosexuality throughout her lifetime. \$200

John Rawls was one of the best-known and most influential figures in political and moral philosophy in the later 20th and early 21st


centuries. A Theory of Justice is the first book in which he laid out his theory of justice as fairness and is widely considered to be his magnum opus. In addition to being one of the landmark works in political philosophy, the book has been extraordinarily influential outside of academic philosophy, particularly in the legal community. Rawls work is clearly within the tradition of classic liberalism, but is filled with original and engaging arguments and has spawned a vast literature. A very attractive copy of this essential and justly renowned work in political philosophy. \$1,250







on the front pastedown. Bernard Suzanne, "Plato and His Dialogues". This volume contains an antiquated grouping of four of Plato's dialogues. The four here are grouped according to conventions of Greek Tragedy (as argued by Diogenes Laertius and Thrasyllus). Euthyphro, Apology, and Crito all relate to the laws driving the trial and execution of Socrates, as well as reporting Socrates' last days alive. Phaedo's subject matter is lighter: it centers on a discussion of the destiny of the human soul after death. Thus, the grouping has the three tragic works and one "comedic" work, a Greek dramatic tetraology. A beautiful volume, containing one of the most moving stories in philosophical history. \$275





