Also with in-text designs. Illustrated by Philip R. Goodwin and Charles Livingston Bull. Decorated by Charles Edw.




Hooper. Near Fine. Very light rubbing to the boards' edges and to the "snow" on the front board, a touch of foxing to the final plate. Ahearn APG 007b. BAL 11876. According to Ahearn APG: "The Call of the Wild was the first book to bring [Jack London] broad recognition and lead to his being called the highest paid, best-known and most popular writer in the world by 1913." London's tale brings the Alaskan wilderness to life, and is one of the first to center around a dog's perspective on humans and the natural world. A nice copy of one of the most significant American novels ever published. \$2,500

Illustrated with a few full-page drawings (done in black and white) by Roy Doty. Jacket design by Roy Doty. Near Fine in Very Good dust jacket. A hint of wear to the spine's crown; jacket with a few traces of edge wear and very light soiling. This classic from Blume is difficult to find in the first edition with its dust jacket. A touching family story about Peter Hatcher and the difficulties he faces living with his toddler-brother, Fudge. \$1,250













Housed in a custom black cloth slipcase. Very Good in Near Fine dust jacket. A name on the front pastedown, two small tape ghosts to the half-title page; mild sunning to the jacket's spine and front panels. Ahearn APG 042c. Gallup A34b. The basis for the beloved musical *Cats*. A fantastical short poem about anthropomorphic cats and their antics. One of Eliot's most beloved books. \$1,000






Signed without personalization by Gaiman on the title page. Winner of the 2009 Newbery Award. The charming story of a boy being raised by ghosts, a modern adaptation of Kipling's Jungle Book. \$300

An inspiring story about a smart young girl who uses her gifts to create a better life for herself and for those who believe in her. \$300













Chattanooga Daily Times, Chattanooga, Tennessee · Friday, July 15, 1960. Warren Hastings Miller was an outdoor enthusiast, serving as the editor of the nature magazine Field and Stream for eight years. He wrote and published over 30 books, including several titles for young readers. This is an adventure story of a boy attempting to survive in the Canadian wilderness alone. \$350



The sequel to Brooks' beloved Sword of Shannara, in which Wil (the grandson of the protagonist of Sword of Shannara) must safely escort the elf Amberle on a quest to save their world from the forces of evil. \$1,650



The winner of the 1982 Newbery Award, increasingly difficult to find in the first edition. \$125

Per Hammond and Anderson, the British domestic and export editions were published simultaneously. This is the first British trade edition, with the typos in the text, with the dust jacket price, and with no head or tailbands as called for by Hammond and Anderson. A stunning copy of this important work by a most influential and beloved writer of fantasy. \$500



The publisher produced these posters as advertisement material for bookstores around the country to generate interest from the general public for the book. The poster's recto has an image of the dust jacket (rear panel to front panel) laid out with the caption "For the first time ... two top Disney artists reveal all the intimate, exciting secrets of how Disney's animated films were made. Thousands of original step-by-step drawings show how the characters come to life on the screen. It's sheer Disney magic! A gift the whole family will enjoy! See it now! From Abbeville Press". With another caption in a border, "See salesperson to order your copy now!". The book was authored by two of Disney's influential animators, Frank Thomas and Ollie Johnston. Near Fine.
