
1. Jefferson, Thomas. Notes on the State of Virginia. London: John Stockdale, 1787. First UK edition. 8vo. [5], 2-382, [2] pp. Contemporary calf with the spine in seven compartments; all edges navy. Illustrated with a folding table. Good. Both joints starting, a crack in the spine's leather, the gatherings remain secure by their sewing. Lacks the map and the free front endpaper. The leaves in our copy are quite clean and bright. The American Philosophical Society, "Thomas Jefferson 1784". Howes J78. Sabin 35896. Oxford DNB, Toby Barnard, "Beaufort, Daniel Augustus (1739–1821)". The armorial bookplate of the Reverend Daniel Augustus Beaufort, an Anglican priest and cartographer. Beaufort is best-known for his map of Ireland, his in-


strumental role in establishing Sunday schools, and for publishing educational works for young readers. Jefferson's history of Virginia: with commentary on the state's landscape, flora and fauna, also with commentary on the state's political institutions. The work was first published in Paris. Jefferson compiled this work during the Revolutionary War, and intended for these writings to be seen only by French diplomats. The work became so popular in French political circles however, that it was printed in London just a few years after the Paris edition, then the work was later printed in the United States. A fascinating narrative of Virginia as it was during the Revolutionary War. \$8,000





A bookplate from 1875 on the front pastedown, the faint odor of tobacco to the leaves. This edition not in Graesse. The Song of Roland portrays a French knight who fought for Charlemagne at the end of the eighth century. The poem is said to be the oldest surviving complete work of French literature. The epic poem is followed by "Chronique de Turpin", the Carolingnian work on Charlemagne's campaigns in early-medieval Spain. The Turpin Chronicle is based on military legends of early-medieval France, but it is not in fact historical. Its composition is said to have taken place at the end of the eleventh century into the beginning of the twelfth century. Translated from the Anglo-Norman into modern French by Alex. De Saint-Albin; the Turpin Chronicle was originally written in Latin but is published here in French. A lovely edition of the epic poem integral to the French literary and historical canons. \$300












Porter 352. The author's third book, published in the same year as the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and one year before the Voting Rights Act was passed. The photographs capture moments from the non-violent resistance movement, such as the March on Washington, as well as moments of police brutality towards the protestors. One of the photographs is a beautiful image of King and his family in their home. With a newspaper clipping from 1969 laid in, from the New York Times Book Review: a review of William Robert Miller's book, Martin Luther King, Jr.: His Life, Martyrdom and Meaning for the World. A stirring call for racial equality one year after King delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. A true high-spot in twentieth-century history and social science literature. \$625

A landmark work in postmodern political theory: Fanon considers the role of violence in overthrowing colonial regimes and in undoing the oppression of the colonized. The author also explores the psychology of colonization, and what effects oppression has on members of a colonized territory. At the time of publication several African nations were still under European rule. This work considered what was required, and what was justified, when a group of people sought their independence and their right to govern themselves. \$1,000













Completing the title page: "During the war which established the independence of his country, and First President of the United States. Compiled under the inspection of the Honourable Bushrod Washington, from original papers bequeathed to him by his deceased relative, and now in possession of the author. To which is prefixed an introduction, containing a compendious view of the colonies plant-



ed by the English on the continent of North America, from their settlement to the commencement of that war which terminated in their independence". The first three volumes dated 1804, the final dated 1805. Later American editions omitted the history of the colonies, which is the subject of the first volume. Very Good. Light wear to the boards' corners and spines, foxing to the pageblocks. Howes M317. Larned 1561. Reese 92. Sabin 44788. Without the fifth text volume and without the illustrated quarto volume. John Marshall was one of the early Chief Justices of the United States Supreme Court. His life of Washington is based on the papers that were in the possession of Bushrod Washington, the First President's nephew and an Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Well-regarded at the time of its publication, this set remains a valuable history of George Washington's life. \$500



Illustrated with a frontispiece portrait of George Washington and with eleven plates, all engravings done in black and white. Very Good. The foot of the spine starting, heavy rubbing to the boards' corners. Some foxing to the pageblock, common with American paper of this era. Evans 38776. The plates contain famous moments from North American history like Pocahontas and John Smith's meeting, the death of Montgomery in the French and Indian War, the burning of women accused of being witches, etc. Goodrich wrote several histories of the United States aimed towards young readers. This one contains additional material with the appendix on the different states. According to Evans three different New York publishers produced editions of this work in 1829. A.K. White's edition is listed first in the bibliography. A charming work on colonial and revolutionary America. \$200



Sabin 63860. First published in Richmond, this is the revised New York imprint done in the same year. The book's author is credited with coining the phrase "Lost Cause", an expression which spurred resentment against federal reconstruction after the U.S. Civil War. Pollard felt that the Confederacy had been wronged and that it was justified in its secession and attempt to maintain American slavery. The author was an outspoken critic of Jefferson Davis during his term as President of the Confederacy, and felt that Davis mismanaged the conflict. Pollard would later be taken as a prisoner by the North after he attempted to sail to England to seek support for the Confederacy. \$250
