



the leaves have their paper peeling but all are holding strong, one photograph has a spot of foxing. Maine Memory Network, "S. E. Spring at Factory Island Wharf, ca. 1885". The subject matter consists of the sights of Maine at the end of the nineteenth century. One photograph is dated July 4th, 1893 in contemporary pencil. Children on the coast, men and women on the rocky shoreline of Maine, the beaches, docks, lighthouses, and sailboats of Maine are all depicted in the photographs. Most of the adults depicted appear to be either a family or a friend group. There are two photographs of women engaging in amateur photography, and one photograph of the four women in the album rowing near the shore in a boat together. Five

of the sailboats in the album are named (the original owner penciled the name on the grey paper leaves). There are a few photographs of men on the water in the sailboats. The original owner also penciled in the names of Folly Cove, Rockfort, Portland, and Kennebunk on the corresponding images of each of these places. There is one photograph of the S.E. Spring, an excursion sidewheeler steamer, which gave trips to tourists between 1885 and 1890. It no longer sailed after 1890. A wonderful collection of stunning images from the Atlantic seaboard, focused on the beautiful state of Maine as it left the nineteenth century. \$750












A flagship work in Stoic literature, Marcus Aurelius' *Meditations* were written at the end of his lifetime during his campaigns against various Germanic tribes. His twelve books contain advice to himself, wisdom that he learned from his grandfather and father, and from his upbringing in Rome. His *Meditations* was his most famous and only published work, and it helped scholars to understand the basic tenets of Stoic Philosophy. A lovely copy. \$600





Each photogravure plate has a small dampstain on its fore-edge, the spine has a minute dent but the book is otherwise beautiful. Howgego S60. Mounteney-Jephson was an officer selected by Stanley to assist in the relief expedition for Emin Pasha (Eduard Schnitzer). He was included in the expedition thanks to a 1,000 pound donation from his cousin the


Countess de Noailles, to whom this book is dedicated. Stanley and his men sailed up the Congo, and then marched through the Ituri forest, as the other routes to the province of Equatoria were blocked. Stanley lost 180 men in the forest to disease and injury, and the expedition is regarded as one of the most grueling in history. They did eventually rendez-vous with Emin Pasha, but Pasha was only too happy to continue occupying the settlement that he created, so he was reluctant to leave. Eventually, however, his soldiers rose up and revolted against him, and he became a prisoner in the territory that he had previously controlled. In the end, 1,510 people left the region, and Stanley and his men and Emin Pasha and his followers formed a large caravan that would make its way to Suez, after mapping Lake Albert Edward Nyanza (a lake that blocked their path because its existence was not known to them). A bright and attractive copy of a thrilling and complicated tale of equatorial travel. \$325



Stanley led a mercenary sort of life: he was





born out of wedlock as John Rowlands, and was sent to a workhouse to be educated. He escaped and then fled to the docks and worked for a merchant whose name he assumed as his own. He immigrated to the U.S. and served in the Civil War, including at the Battle of Shiloh, but then deserted the U.S. Navy in 1864, shortly after joining. He worked mostly as a journalist until he was asked to assist in finding and rescuing David Livingstone. He would be commissioned by Leopold to chart and found the Congo State, which would become one of the most brutal examples of imperialism the world would see. Stanley concluded his travels by rescuing Emin Pasha, traversing Equatorial Africa to do it, and would tour Canada and the United States after the fact. Includes essays by Bohr, Born, Reichenbach, Pauli, and the well-known essay by Godel in which he argues (based upon his solutions to the field equations of general relativity in 1949) that Parmenides was right in that change is an illusion based upon our conceptual framework and our sensory perceptions. An exceptional copy of this fascinating study of the scientist who so profoundly shaped the twentieth century. \$1,500



The front endpaper has two ownership stamps of philosopher and psychologist William James, the first is crossed out (being the older 18 Garden Street address where James resided until moving to his new house in 1889), the second is




the 95 Irving Street address in Cambridge where he lived from 1889 until his death in 1910. There is also a slip of paper tipped in to the front endpaper with "PHILOS. III." printed on it. This book is not in Algaier who lists all of James' books and pamphlets that were donated to Harvard University by James and others (2,554 items), nor is it listed in the catalogue of The Hocking Collection (at the University of Massachusetts-Lowell). Therefore this book must be one of the many that were given away as gifts to colleagues or sold at the "yard sale" held in 1923. The photographs of James' library circa 1923 (see Algaier p. 4-5) suggest that it consisted of at least 4,000 volumes (Algaier suggests it may be double that), so a large portion of James' personal library is either lost or privately held. The book does contain underlining and light marginalia (vertical bars to emphasize passages and reference numbers) mostly in pencil, but we are unable to ascertain if this is the work of James himself or a later owner. James is one of the most important American philosophers of the nineteenth century and books from his personal library are scarce in commerce. \$2,000





Volume six of Schriften was published several years after Oxford published Wittgenstein's Remarks on Mathematics, and this set offers its version of that work as a revised and expanded one. There were two additional volumes of Schriften issued after volume six both of which are lacking here (volume 7 is the Lectures on the Foundations of Mathematics, and volume 8 is Remarks on the Philosophy of Psychology). Given that the books were issued over the course of several decades in realtively small quantities, a complete set of first printings in collectible condition is uncommon. The volumes in our set include many of Wittgenstein's principal writings: Philosophical Investigations, Remarks on the Foundations of Mathematics, Notebooks, the Tractatus, and more. A very attractive set of the majority of Wittgenstein's corpus in its original language. \$750

A written record of Bob Dylan's Rolling Thunder Tour, designed to coalesce with the U.S. Bicentennial. Dylan stopped at 22 cities in the U.S., touring with numerous musicians and other singer-songwriters. A fascinating look at the Rock and Roll era, by one of the twentieth century's premier playwrights. \$500

Based on a paper of the same title first presented in 1936, the book is a critical examination of historicism, the view that there is a theory of historical development that would serve as a basis to foretell the future of human society. Wilgus praises the presentation of the melodies in this book. John Lomax began lecturing on American folk songs in 1910. He grew up recording cowboy ballads that he learned from his friends and neighbors. Nat Blythe, a Black man with whom Lomax was friends, taught Lomax traditional spiritual songs from the African-American community. In the early 1930's, John Lomax took to traveling the country full-time, recording folk songs everywhere he went. His son Alan Lomax would often accompany him, especially at this point in his career. Lomax was a key player at the Archive of American Folksong at the Library of Congress, compiling a huge range of folk music for their records. Lomax's work continues to be important to modern ethnomusicologists. His primary objective was to popularize folk music, and the public image of American folk music's heritage. He helped Americans understand that their folk music descended from diverse sources. The final publication in which the father and son team worked together to produce a history of American folk music. \$150

The first edition of West's Pindar is rather difficult to find in commerce. Pindar is arguably the most famous of the Archaic Greek poets. His poetry is notably difficult to read (in Greek and English). His most popular pieces are focused on the celebrations and high points of the Olympic games. His poems help the historian to put the Olympic games in their proper context, and they help the historian understand what the games meant to Ancient Greek citizens and athletes alike. SEP "Personal Identity and Ethics". Parfit's magnum opus, a masterful exploration of the issue of personal identity and its implications for moral theory. Parfit espoused the "psychological continuity" view of personal identity: in order for a person P at a time t1 to be identical to a person Q at a time t2, P must be uniquely psychologically continuous with Q, that is, P's memories, intentions, beliefs, and desires at t1 must be in "an overlapping chain of strong psychological connectedness" with Q's memories, intentions, beliefs, and desires at t2. The great significance and influence of this book rests upon Parfit's further claim that, in effect, identity doesn't matter, what matters is psychological continuity or connectedness (without any uniqueness requirement); in particular, Parfit contends that our survival is dependent only upon this psychological continuity or connectedness, not on personal identity. Parfit then explores the consequences of this view for moral theory and argues that this conception of the self has a significant impact on the concept of self-interest and prudence in regard to decision making about our later selves, with the latter becoming a matter of morality. The influence of this book cannot be overstated, and it has generated a vast literature since its publication. A nice copy of this landmark work in personal identity and ethics, exceedingly difficult to find. \$400
