Price of \$5.95 on the front flap of the dust jacket. Illustrated with four plates of black and white photographs. Very near Fine in Near Fine dust jacket. A small crease on the rear flap of the jacket. Schneebaum's record of his journey alone through the Amazonian jungle, where he walked and slept for eight days while trying to reach remote peoples who lived in the region (specifically, the Akaramas). Schneebaum's book describes his time with this tribe, and comments on the tribe's acceptance and practice of homosexuality. This acceptance made Schneebaum, a gay man, feel more free living with the Akaramas, in comparison to the 1950's United States. Schneebaum also reports on cannibalism in his book, and though the accuracy of this chapter of his memoir is debated, his book was nonetheless a sensation upon publication. \$250

With writings from Angela Davis, James Baldwin, George Jackson, Bobby Seale, and Ericka Huggins. A landmark work in the Black Power movement, with writings from several leaders of the movement. National Museum of African American History and Culture, "Angela Davis, b. 1944". This book was published just after Davis was accused of participating in conspiracy and murder with the so-called "Soledad Brothers". Davis spent 18 months in prison, and in 1972 was acquitted by an all-white jury of all charges levied against her. Davis cuts a striking figure in both American and Black history: she has spent her life fighting for equality and justice for marginalized peoples. \$500









A.C.E., and began life enslaved to a Roman noble. He was taught to read and write by a Roman Senator, and would eventually open his own school of philosophy. His work survived through a historiographer's (Arrian of Nicomedia) careful compilation of his lectures. These are known as the *Discourses*, with *The Enchiridion* being a shortened version of the *Discourses*. Epictetus was one of the most prominent Stoic thinkers, concerned with self-regulation, integrity, and proper perception of one's personal circumstances. Collectible sets of the *Discourses* are difficult to find, and these are sharp and attractive examples of the monumental philosopher's work. \$400






Our jacket has a Newbery Medal sticker on it, however, this does not make it a later dust jacket. Newbery stickers are produced and sold by the American Library Association. Anyone, from a bookseller, a collector, or a librarian, can purchase and then paste a Newbery sticker onto a book's dust jacket. When it comes to books and their jackets, issues and states are determined based on the decisions of publishers and printers as they relate to the production and design of the book and its jacket



Newbery stickers are products of the American Library Association, and have nothing to do with the publisher or the printer, or the planned design of a book. This first edition copy in its first edition jacket was likely leftover stock in a bookstore, and the bookseller used a Newbery sticker as a marketing tool to try to get the book to sell. Whether or not it worked, remains unknown. This story is the sequel to *Homecoming*, and it follows the story of Dicey and her three younger siblings and their new life with their grandmother. The *Tillerman Cycle* challenges social conventions and societal norms as it follows four children who are abandoned by a single mother, and must navigate their way to a safe home. \$325









each volume's front pastedown. Smith was the first in the Smith-Marriott Baronetcy. He was a Fellow of the Royal Society and a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries. Smith also served as the High Sheriff of Dorset. Originally published in Paris in 1787, this is the first English Language edition. Completing the title page: Containing the present natural and political state of those countries, their productions, arts, manufactures, and commerce; with observations on the manners, customs, and government of the Turks and Arabs. According to Cox this is "one of the most exact and valuable works of the kind ever published ... ". Volney served in the Estates-General and was later imprisoned during the reign of terror, before gaining favor with Napoleon. His visit to Syria and Egypt was inspired by a love of ancient history and philology. A fascinating Enlightenment-era travel narrative of the Near East, beautified by its detailed maps and illustrations. \$2,000


lied P.O.W.'s escape Stalag Luft III. Due to his claustrophobia, Brickhill could not participate in the mass escape, but his story is one of courage and sacrifice, helping his fellow soldiers to freedom. Although most of the 76 who escaped were recaptured, the secretive digging, the counterfeiting of the uniforms, passports, and other materials to avoid detection comprise a story of defiance and resistance against Nazi cruelty. Deeply moving, Brickhill's book is one of the best memoirs of the Second World War. \$750

Along the way they travel with a Black man (Daniel) and engage in hostilites with a few Indigenous Americans. However, Walter (the main character) and Daniel eventually befriend members of the Delaware Tribe and Daniel earns the nickname "Black Panther" from his friends in the tribe. A unique milieu of adventure, conflict, and companionship among people from different walks of life. \$300







Difficult to find in the first edition, this work features Jung's work on his classic contributions to psychology which include the idea of a collective unconscious, personality archetypes, and the individual mind versus its own internal biases and upbringing. 

Difficult to find in the dust jacket and in collectible condition. Carl Jung, along with Sigmund Freud, is considered to be one of the founders of the science




of psychology and psychoanalysis. Jung's contributions to the field include the concepts of introverts and extroverts, the idea of personality archetypes, and the "collective unconscious". Although today much of Jung's work is considered unscientific, he is a pioneer in the field and helped it to gain traction and popularity, to the point where it is now a mainstream scientific discipline. The first of these two essays contain Jung's ideas on the origins of psycholanalysis, sexual theory, human desire for power, and his ideas on the individual unconscious and the collective unconscious. The second essay contains more ideas on the individual mind and how the unconscious mind influences real-world action and feeling. \$1,200











Alan Watts wrote prolifically about eastern philosophy and the concept of Zen, and helped to popularize several concepts of Eastern philosophy to a western readership. His work was intended to be accessible to those with a scholarly bent and to those without one. Watts also wrote several texts on comparative religion, and had a keen insight into human culture and thought across the globe. \$1,250

Marcet's educational treatise for young students takes the form of a dialogue between an instructor (Mrs. B) and a student, Caroline. Mrs. B discusses elements of Malthus, Smith, and Ricardo's works with Caroline. Very Good. Rubbing to the extremities; a later bookplate on the front pastedown. Goldsmith 21726. Oxford DNB, Elizabeth J. Morse, "Marcet, Jane Haldimand (1769–1858)". This book was first published in 1816. Jane Marcet is remembered as a



popular writer and educator in the fields of economics and the natural sciences. Her publication on chemistry, intended especially for young female readers, is credited as inspiring Michael Faraday. Her later editions of Conversations on Chemistry would incorporate Faraday's work in their revisions. Marcet wrote for those who were unfamiliar with these sciences, and her publications on chemistry and economics were lauded for their appeal to readers of various education levels. Her books were used in educational settings in several English and French-speaking countries. Marcet believed that young women ought to be educated in the sciences, and did not accept the antiquated view that home economics was the only sphere for women. She should be remembered as a critical figure in women's education, and thanks to her parents' progressive view towards her education, she was able to help other women learn. \$750

The photograph depicts from left to right: Chico, Harpo, and Groucho Marx, all gathered around a harp with cheeky expressions on their faces. The harp that is pictured is the one that was used in their 1939 film At the Circus. Very Good+. A few pinholes and light wear to the corners of the photograph. The Marx Brothers got their start in Vaudeville but would go on to make several motion pictures in the first days of the Silver Screen. Thirteen of their films have been rated in the AFI's top 100 comedic motion pictures: their impact on cinema cannot be overstated. The brothers were sons of German-Jewish immigrants, and their mother Minnie acted as their manager until her passing in 1929. In this photograph going left to right, the three oldest Marx brothers are shown (Chico or Leonard Marx, Adolph or Harpo, and the youngest of the three, Julius or Groucho Marx). \$175








There is a pocket on the rear board, but nothing is in the pocket. Near Very Good. Significant rubbing to the cloth, rear gutter is cracked but the binding is holding. Immediately after the title page, the book states the motives and objects of (the First World) war: "We are glad to fight for the ultimate peace of the world, and for the liberation of its peoples, the German peoples included; for the rights of nations great and small, and the privilege of men everywhere to choose their way of life and obedience ... ". It is an ex-




cerpt from President Wilson's statement on the United States entering the First World War. An inscription on the free front endpaper reads: "Willis [Winfried/Winfreed] 506 S. Neil [The next line is illegible] Illinois 1917 - U.S.A. Great Lakes Illinois". The owner of this prayer book was either trembling while writing his inscription or his ink was exposed to moisture (though the paper itself has no dampstain). This book clearly traveled with the naval recruit to Great Lakes, the naval training station just north of Chicago. Although we cannot identify exactly who the owner was, the item is significant as it is a record of what kind of item was important enough to a Navyman to transport to a war zone (based on the book's significant wear and use we believe it traveled to the European theatre after the recruit completed his training at Great Lakes). \$150



(14 October 1894-03 September 1962)". E.E. Cummings led a turbulent but artistically productive life, with numerous published writings, and completed sculptures and portraits. At the end of his life he became an extremely popular performer of live poetry. This book is a record of his Charles Eliot Norton lectures. The writings in this volume are autobiographical, and they shed a light on his childhood and his artistic development. \$800








"In looking at the record which was made by the Washington team," says the Official Guide, "it is not wholly fair to take merely the position in which the club finished into consideration. There was more than position to it. The players won more games by a large margin than Washington teams had ordinarily been noted for winning, and for a part of the season waxed warm in a contest to beat the Chicagos, and even had designs upon the place which was beld by Cleveland. Unfortunately not all of the pitchers finished as well as they had begun, and there were occasional lapses toward the latter part of the year in which Washington lost opportunity to advance by reason of failure to win double-headers."

The 1910 team included: Pitchers—Johnson, Waiker, Reisling, Groom, Gray, Otey, Moyer.



Parfit's 2002 Tanner lectures make up a large part of volumes one and two, and overall the volumes are wide-ranging in their scope and depth. This work earned the praise of several philosophers, including a statement from Peter Singer that this set was the most significant work published in moral philosophy since Sidgwick's 1874, *Methods in Ethics.* \$350
