everywhere he went. His son Alan Lomax would often accompany him. During his travels, he focused on recording "prison songs", specifically, songs from African-American inmates in the South. During his work in the 1930's, Lomax helped advocate for the early release of several prison inmates, including Leadbelly. Huddie Ledbetter, or Leadbelly, was a key historical source for Lomax's work. Lomax and his son would go on to tour with Leadbelly after his release from prison in Louisiana. Lomax was a key player at the Archive of American Folksong at the Library of Congress, compiling a huge range of folk music for their records. Lomax's work continues to be important to modern ethnomusicologists. His primary objective was to popularize folk music, and the public image of American folk music's heritage. He helped Americans understand that their folk music descended from diverse sources: both Black and white people helped create the tradition of the American ballad. \$1,000


FINAL RECONNAISSANCE TO MEDICINE BLUFF

Colonel Grierson made up a reconnaissance party consisting of himself, Colonel Hazen, Colonel Forsythe of Sheridan's staff, Captain Clous, Lieutenant S. L. Woodward, and Mr. Randolph Keim, a journalist. The escort was composed of forty cavalrymen rom the Tenth, commanded by Lieutenant Doyle. The interpreter vas Phillip McCusker, and the guide was Asa-Toyeh (Gray Leggings), a Penateka Comanche.18

The expedition left Fort Cobb at nine o'clock on the morning of December 27, 1868. At eleven the following morning they utrived north of Medicine Bluff. Here they paused to admire the



John Franklin's expedition was one of the most well-equipped in British naval history, and he and his crew's disappearance rocked the naval community.
