4. Manifold, Huber S.; [Scrapbooks]. Scrapbook of an American Road Trip from New Jersey to the West Coast and Back Again, 1938. Pennington, N.J., 1938. 26.5 x 31 cm. [2], 48 pages filled, [several unpaginated leaves after the end of the scrapbook's content]. Buckram cloth with a maroon label pasted on the front cover reading, "My Scrapbook: A book which hath been called from the flowers of all books" - George Eliot. Illustrated with 96 black and white photographs of the group's cross country trip from Pennington, New Jersey to Seattle, Washington. Photographs capture the sights of many of the United States National Parks, including the Grand Canyon, Zion National Park, Yellowstone, Mt. Rainier, Yosemite, Crater Lake, and Glacier National Park. Most of the photographs have notes of explanation on the reverse. Photographs range in size from 11 x 7 cm to 20 x 25 cm. Very Good: the front joint is split but holding, some pieces of the taped-in ephemera show a tiny corner crease. The tour group consisted of two couples: Huber S. Manifold, his wife Beatrice Manifold, and their friends, Paul and Ruth. According to Find a Grave, Huber S. Manifold was a school teacher in Pennington, New Jersey, until he moved to eastern Pennsylvania later in his life. The scrapbook carefully documents the cross-country road trip. Each of the 48 pages is dated, the first one starting June 27, 1938, at Fort Royal, VA, the last one dated August 5th, 1938, ending in Pennington, N.J., the group's home town. Manifold also records where the group stayed, the weather, any car trouble he had, and what the couples ate for breakfast and dinner. Two menus from the La Placita Cafe of Albuquerque, New Mexico are taped into the scrapbook, with an advertisement from the Black Cat Cafe in Flagstaff, AZ.



Manifold takes careful notes about the quality of his food, and whether it was a "Mexican or Italian dinner". Other highlights include the couples' days in New Mexico and Arizona. Manifold writes that they ate lunch in the shade in 100 + degree heat, but did get to visit Adobe Pueblo houses. In Tuba City, AZ, the group drove through Native American Reservations and spoke to some of the residents of the area. Manifold referred to the Native American populace of Moencopie Hopi Indian village as "rather progressive" (reflecting some of the prejudices of his day). On July 4, 1938, Mani-


fold and his group attended a "Southwest Indian Pow Wow" (name taken from the two ticket stubs in the scrapbook). He taped in six photographs of scenes from the festival, five of which show various feats of horsemanship, the sixth showing a group of what appear to be the festival participants competing in the "Better Indian Babies Contest". The Black Cat Cafe advertisement contains the itinerary for the three day festival, listing the 82 individual names of the Native American men participating in the events. The men were from a few different tribes: the Hopi, the Navajo, the Apache, the Ute, the Havasupai, the Maricopa, the Hualapai, and the Paiute. The Fourth of July itinerary of the contest lists events like "The Better Indian Babies Contest", Bronco riding, calf roping, 1/2 mile bareback cowpony race, bulldogging, bronco riding, and others. The night program lists seventeen dances, songs, and chants performed by the Hopi, Navajo, Zuni, Kiowa, and Apache people. On this page Manifold has also taped in a program for the Petrified Forest Monument of Arizona, listing the stop as "very much worthwhile".




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The next page of course, has photographs of the Grand Canyon, with the page after it depicting the sights of Zion National Park. Other national landmarks Manifold and his group visited include Boulder Dam (now the Hoover Dam), with a brochure taped in discussing highlights and fun facts about the dam. Manifold notes that he enjoyed "the talkies of the dam construction at Boulder City". The following pages review the group's visit to Los Angeles, then San Diego, with several brochures from their stops such as the horse racing track at Santa Anita, Old Town San Diego (with two brochures advertising it as Ramona's birthplace, the protagonist from Helen Hunt Jackson's novel), and three photographs from San Juan Capistrano. Manifold also taped in a brochure from Yosemite, with a map and activities to do in the park noted. The photographs on this page depict Bridal Veil Falls, and Mirror Lake. The group swings north to Palo Alto and then to San Francisco, with a photograph of Fisherman's Wharf and a panoramic view of a harbor from Coit Hill. The caption on this photograph says "F.D.R. reviews the fleet. F.D.R. is aboard S.S. Houston. S.S. Pennsylvania - flagship - has just fired its salute." S.S. Pennsylvania would later suffer minor damage at Pearl Harbor.





After San Francisco, the group drove north to Bend, OR, with a few pictures of Crater Lake taped in the scrapbook. After Bend, Manifold and his party traveled on to Seattle, WA. They toured Puget Sound, Mt. Rainier, and the Weverhaeuser Timber Co. The liability waiver releasing the Timber Co. from any responsibility in regards to potential accidents or death is pasted in with Manifold's signature. The waiver warns tourists to not smoke, and to not speak to the employees. Manifold writes "Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. - largest in world - spent a very enjoyable + profitable two and a half hours on the grounds of the plant". On a later page, the group tours the City of Seattle's Department of Lighting, with a Lady's Souvenir Ticket (printed on pink paper) and a Man's Souvenir Ticket (printed on blue paper) pasted in. On July 24th, when the group is visiting friends in Washington State, there are three photographs of the traveling party (Paul, Bee, Ruth, and Huber). On the way back, Manifold pasted in the Motorists Guide to Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park, with a holiday card from Paul and Ruth showing Heavens Peak in Glacier National Park laid in. The last two notable stops in the groups' road trip include Yellowstone National Park and the Chicago Stock Exchange. For Yellowstone's page, Manifold taped in a picture of Bee and Ruth at the Continental Divide with two photographs of grizzly bears eating lunch out of a lake. He also included two photographs of Old Faithful. For the Chicago Stock Exchange, Manifold taped in two brochures. On the way back the group stopped in Ontario, Canada, to visit relatives. From there they drove home to New Jersey. A detailed documentation of a fascinating Depression -era road trip, reflecting important historical moments and sights of the American Southwest, West, and Pacific Northwest. \$800





A Very Good+ book with several tiny spots of faint discoloration to the textblock; dust jacket shows a faint dampstain to the bottom edge of the reverse, but presents excellently. ANB, Lauren Araiza and Joshua Bloom, "Cleaver, Eldridge". Written during his time in prison, Cleaver's book is a series of open letters and essays exploring the social and oppressive forces that molded his life. It is his most significant work and the best biography of his life. Cleaver was a thoroughly complicated figure, remembered for his organizational skills and leadership within the Black Panther Party. He worked for years in San Francisco to advance the goal of Afro-American Unity. His writings that would eventually be published as *Soul on Ice* were smuggled out of Soledad State Prison by a civil rights lawyer, Beverly Axelrod, to whom the book is dedicated. Cleaver was a charismatic leader and speaker, and formed alliances between the Black Panthers and Students for a Democratic Society, the United Farmworkers of America, and the anti-Vietnam War movement. He also founded the International Section of the Black Panther Party, giving voice to the struggle of Black people all over the world for autonomy and social liberation. A fascinating figure, Cleaver's collection of essays and letters provides a critical perspective on important moments in Black history. \$375


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




Originally published in 1770, the Langhornes' translation in Moss is referred to as "[b]etter informed ... with more liberal views than are usually to be found in the interpreters of the ancients ... [the translators] are fully qualified ... [The Langhornes] expressed their conceptions of their Author with fidelity, they have been attentive to render him with elegance." Plutarch was a prolific writer, a historian, and a Platonic philosopher. His Parallel Lives intended to exemplify examples of virtuous ancient figures (mostly men). Caesar, Pompey, Brutus, Alexander the Great, Marc Antony, and other lives receive a treatment from Plutarch in his magnum opus. For each entry Plutarch explores the figure's family, education, debut in public life, interesting anecdotes, good and bad luck, the end of their life, and their death. Although the historical value of Plutarch's biographies are frequently called into question, they function as a critical text for understanding the ancient world for scholars from the Renaissance to the present day. \$500





Illustrated endpapers and pastedowns (maps of Greece), with a frontispiece drawing of a hanging monastery and thirty-one additional plates of photographs (ninety-seven total photographs) from the author's journey around Greece. Jacket shows a tiny closed tear to its front panel and a touch of fading to the spine panel, overall a stunning copy. Franck documents his visit to the Parthenon, to the royal tomb at Mycenae, his time in Cyprus, his tours of Greek chapels and monasteries, interactions with rural Greek women, his companion's love of Greek pottery, a visit to the Temple of Zeus, (at which the author states "a pillar of the Temple lies like a stack of poker chips where washout and wind tumbled it long ago"), and his visit to Crete. A well-documented sojourn around Greece, capturing the ancient civilization, Balkan ethnic groups in Greece, and the modern religions of the country. An exceptional copy, difficult to find in nice condition. \$200

The pamphlets range from ex-Library to Very Good with the first two pages from the Revue excised with a library call-number and a stamp on the front cover, Bolshevist Russia also has a library stamp on its front cover with the other two pamphlets showing some wear to their spines (these two Very Good). This is a notebook, composed by Clarence Tilker, containing illustrated lecture notes from an ancient history course taught by Professor Michael Rostovtzeff of UW Madison in the autumn of 1922. Four pamphlets were laid in to the notebook, likely due to their connection to ancient history and because they were authored by Professor Rostovtzeff.






The text of Tilker's notebook is largely type-written with hand-written annotations of his own notes. There are seven pages of his manuscript hand bound in the rear. The rear of the notebook also has the study guide for the final exam and the actual Blue Book for the final exam of this course. Tilker's notebook is illustrated with a photograph of Michael Rostovtzeff, with Clarence's writing underneath: "Prof Rostovtzeff", and with five plates of hand-drawn illustrations of various images from the course (one plate is a page of black and white photographs of bronze Athenian figures), six black and white photographs of archaeological sites pasted into the notebook, and sixty hand-drawn figures scattered in the text of the notebook. Two of the pamphlets are illustrated: Ancient Decorative Wall-Painting has four plates of images, and Queen Dynamis of Bosporus has two plates with images of archaeological remains. Tilker expended a great deal of time and effort on his notes. Many of the drawings are well-rendered, depicting the Treasury of Atreus, the Mycenean Akropolis, Minoan deities, pottery, and archaeological strata, with mainland Greek vases and pottery drawn in the notebook as well. Professor Rostovtzeff's course begins with the principals of archaeological work, how to excavate and properly study the different strata, and gives guidance in how to study pottery remains. The Neolithic Age, the Bronze Age, and the Iron Age are all reviewed. A large portion of time is spent on Schliemann's excavations at Ancient Troy.




Afterwards, the course shifted to a study of Minoan Civilization. Tilker has notes (and drawings) of the palace and art of Knossos and notes on Cretan and Minoan pottery and hieroglyphs. The end of the course covers Greek vase painting, and art in Ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia (specifically Assyrian art and artifacts found at Nineveh). There is a brief lesson on how all three of the civilization's art styles compare to one another. This notebook is a fascinating window into college-level history courses in the early twentieth century. This was an exciting time for archaeology, with the excavations of King Tut's tomb and significant work on the Valley of the Kings beginning under Howard Carter and his team. Near Eastern studies were becoming more mainstream in ancient history during this time. Courses on classical antiquity became more interdisciplinary in style, as historians learned more about the Near East, as evidenced by Tilker's notes. A visually impressive and important record of archaeological study, enhanced by Tilker's organization and decoration of his notes. \$1,250






A Very Good set with moderate wear to the extremities gently exposing many of the corners, and a rub to the front joint of volume six; front gutter in volume one neatly strengthened, a plate in volume six is incomplete, with a small portion of it removed. Blackmer 1093. Lowndes 2923-2924. John Gardner Wilkinson was the son of a reverend and a classical scholar. His mother the scholar taught him how to draw. In 1821, upon his arrival to Egypt, Wilkinson abandoned his army career and spent twelve years traveling around the Nile, and the eastern and western deserts. He excavated at numerous Egyptian archaeological sites and drew the results of his work into his notebooks. Wilkinson's work was focused on ancient Thebes. He created the numbering system for the tombs in the Valley of the Kings. His map of Thebes was later published in a limited quantity by the Royal Society. His most important (and popular) publication was his Manners and Customs of the Ancient Egyptians. His series contains a detailed, vivid narrative of daily life in ancient Egypt. Wilkinson relied on paintings in Egyptian tombs to create his picture of daily life in ancient Egypt. His series went through many publications, and Wilkinson later received a knighthood in 1839 for his work. J.G. Wilkinson helped to found the field of Egyptology in Great Britain, and his notebooks, sketches, and private collection of antiquities contain a legacy of significant archaeological study. His collections remain in England (many at the Bodleian). An early archaeologist, and one of the first Egyptologists, Wilkinson's series is a high spot in the publishing history of books on antiquity. \$1,650








The sequel to Stevenson's literary classic, *Kidnapped*, and a fine installation in the *Scribner's Illustrated Classics* series. N.C. Wyeth completed illustrations for adventure novels like Stevenson's *Treasure Island, Kidnapped*, Defoe's *Robinson Crusoe, The Boy's King Arthur*, and others. Wyeth was a student of Howard Pyle's, and his signature illustration style remains desirable to readers and collectors of today. A giant in modern American illustration, N.C. Wyeth's indelible images remain the standard for depicting the world of pirates, duels, and escapades during the eighteenth century. A truly exceptional copy. **\$800**








The first Pickering edition, reprinted from the Oxford edition with Tyrwhitt's scholarly notes and glossary. A receipt on onion skin is tucked in the rear of volume one, from George M Millard Rare and Fine Imported Books in Pasadena. George and Alice Millard were giants in the book trade of early twentieth-century Southern California. After George M. Millard's death in 1918 Alice ran the bookstore by herself, and had a small museum devoted to her own private collection of rare books and manuscripts. Her house and its addition devoted to her private collection was built by Frank Lloyd Wright and his son. Alice took pride in importing rare books from Europe into the United States and selling them to some of the wealthiest clients in the country, including J.P. Morgan and famous book collector Estelle Doheny. A beautiful set of one of the earliest significant English poems, capturing medieval ribald humor, and the challenges European men and women faced in the Middle Ages. \$1,500





Encyclopedia Britannica, "Anatole France French Writer". Anatole France, the son of a bookseller, was an avowed humanist and lover of literature. This was one of his most significant publications, first released in French in 1893, later published in English in 1910. The Bodley head released the Papé illustrated edition in 1922, with this one printed in America the next year. France's novel concerns a young man living in early eighteenth-century France, and his path to become educated. The novel subtly mocks belief in the occult. A beautifully illustrated edition of France's historical novel. \$300







