
the page of publisher's advertisements are dated 1771. With a half-title, and two title pages: one in English and one in French. Illustrated with a folding frontispiece and with one plate, and with seven folding plates. The plates are beautifully done, showing the different forms and techniques in master-level fencing. Extraordinarily difficult to find in the first edition. Written by one of the most popular masters of the small sword in London. Castle states this work was one of the most commonly consulted of the period. An attractive publication on fencing and swordsmanship. \$2,500





2. Major, Clarence. Black Slang: A Dictionary of Afro-American Talk. London: Routledge & Kegan Paul (1971). First UK edition. Small 8vo. [8], 9-127, [1] pp. Black cloth with silver lettering on the spine. Price of £1.25 net on the front flap of the dust jacket. First published in 1970 in New York. Very Good+ in Near Fine dust jacket. Two owner stamps, one on the rear pastedown and one on the title page, a smidge of foxing to the top textblock; jacket with very minor edge wear and toning to the reverse. In the introduction Major describes Black slang as "a powerful medium of self-defence against a world demanding participation while at the same time laying a boobytrap-network of rejection and exploitation". He further explains it as "another ethnic aspect of a long, painful struggle toward human freedom". The words in the dictionary were taken from Major's lived experience, from the lived experience of his peers, and from select printed sources (the book includes a bibliography at the end). Poetry Foundation, "Clarence Major". Clarence Major is a poet and scholar, and a recipient of numerous honors throughout his lifetime, including a Fulbright Fellowship and the 2015 "Lifetime Achievement Award in the Fine Arts" by the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation. Difficult to find in hardcover, this is a very valuable historical record of the American Black community's daily life. \$350








ESTC T128551. Yolton 364. Our volume two is the second state according to Yolton, with the Awnsham imprint on the title page. The second edition of Locke's collected works. Locke is one of the principal figures in modern philosophy, and his views are still salient in contemporary discussions in epistemology, metaphysics, philosophy of mind, and political philosophy. Pyle began as a children's book illustrator, and established new standards in American book-making with his designs, with William Morris among one of his numerous fans. Pyle's striking illustrations illuminate these Arthurian tales, a classic example of his work. \$450





Barnes, a thoughtful scholar on Ancient Philosophy, gives a rigorous and precise exposition on the arguments of the Pre-Socratics, and explains how these contributed to the foundations of Western Philosophy. Difficult to find in the first edition, this is a classic and informative text on the pre-Socratics, founders of the Western philosophical tradition. \$350



Broadfoot cites a Richmond imprint the same year as the Hartford one, however, Dornbusch only mentions the Hartford imprint. The volume contains


full descriptions of the many battles Velasquez fought in, disguised as a Confederate soldier (including the wound she received at Shiloh), details of her spy missions, stories of her career as a Secret-Service agent, a blockade-runner, and her career as a substitute broker in New York. Velazquez also describes her travels in Europe and South America, her mining days in the West, her time living with the Mormons, her first and only marriage, and her life as a single woman. Velazquez writes that her marriage was so unfortunate that she felt better off traveling the world alone, relying on herself for her own protection. A truly remarkable story of a woman who blazed her own trail, and flouted societal conventions during the nineteenth century. \$600







Marbled endpapers and pastedowns. Hogg 1136. Keynes and Kelly incorrectly cite these books as printed in 1849. Very Good. Some rubbing and foxing to the extremities; leaves show scattered foxing. Oxford DNB, John R. DeBruyn, "Helps, Sir Arthur (1813–1875)". The DNB cite Helps as possessing a strong aversion to slavery. The author undertook research on the Spanish colonization of the West Indies and the Americas. After this set, he produced another history of how Spanish Imperialism related to the history of the slave trade. Both sets are the product of seven years of research. The first volume of this set provides a history of the Spanish colony of Hispaniola, and provides details on how the Spanish colonizers usurped the land from the Native people of the Carribbean, and details on how the colonizers treated the local peoples. Native uprisings are described as well. The second volume gives a history of the colonization of Cuba and has a long chapter on Bartolomeo de Las Casas. Las Casas, an enslaver turned Dominican Friar became an abolitionist after he witnessed the Spaniards commit horrible atrocities in Cuba. He would go on to work towards his goal of abolishing the use of slave-labor in the Western Hemisphere. This set is a useful history of Spanish and Portuguese imperialism and its effects in the Americas. \$400





A beautifully illustrated tour of rural England: the plates depict thatch-roofed cottages, streams, and small hamlets in England. \$400









Wing 5237-5238. A large and informative compendium. Stanley's volume includes excerpts of writings from Xenophon, Plato, Diogenes, records of Zeno and Socrates, writings from Chrissipus, and many other ancient philosophers. The volume is thoroughly illustrated, depicting some of these ancient figures in seventheenth-century dress, others are depicted in ancient costumes. Stanley's biographer argued that Stanley outshone his predecessors in the scope and detail included in his work on the history of philosophy. He examined Greek philosophy and its various schools in an impartial manner. This work would eventually become the first two volumes in Stanley's series on ancient philosophy, as he would later publish a third part in 1660, and then a fourth volume on Near Eastern philosophy two years after that. His work was recognized as the standard authority for many years, and was reprinted several times. \$3,000

The Theory of Vision contains a few in-text diagrams. Contains one of the mispaginations in volume II but not the other. Very Good. The volumes rebacked in later unpolished leather, the boards show minor rubbing; the reverse of the front flyleaf of volume one has a pre-20th century inscription citing a 1746 publication, each title page




has a pre-20th century name in its margin. Honderich 89. Jessop 16a. Keynes 15. Mead 10. Written in colonial America, Berkeley's Alciphron is a vigorous defense of Christianity against the atheists, deists, and skeptics of his day. It elicited several responses from other theologians, and would help Berkeley shape his later views concerning philosophy of language. According to Honderich, "Berkeley is a most striking and even unique phenomenon in the history of philosophy. There have been many philosophers who have constructed bold and sweeping ... metaphysical systems ... have been devoted to the clarification and defence of 'common sense' ... some have made it their chief concern to defend religious faith and doctrine against their perceived enemies. It is the peculiar achievement of Berkeley that, with high virtuosity and skill, he contrived to present himself in all these roles at once" (Honderich 89). \$1,250



The author writes that a great deal of his advice comes from common British farmers, supplemented by Cato, Varro, Pliny, and other ancient writers who touch on agriculture. 

Mary Wortley Montagu is most famous for introducing the practice of inoculation into England. She lived in Turkey for a time with her young children and had her son inoculated against smallpox there. In England, she had her young daughter inoculated against the disease. She herself survived a bout of smallpox, with volume five containing a poem on the subject of her illness. However, Lady Montagu had many more accomplishments besides this. She was a pre-eminent woman of letters, corresponding with Congreve, Pope, and other literati of England. She lived in Turkey, Italy, and France throughout her life, and defied the expectations for women of her rank. Lady Montagu separated from her husband after an unhappy marriage (by living separately from him). She escaped a group of notorious banditti in Italy, contributed a piece to the Spectator, and translated Epictetus' Encheiridion, (the translation contained here in the first volume). This is the first collected set of her works: her poems, letters, essays, and writings on her unconventional life of adventure during the eighteenth century. \$500







Blackmer 736. Ibrahim-Hilmy 342. Kinglake records his voyage around the Mediterranean and the Dead Seas, stopping in Turkey, Egypt, Syria, Lebanon, Israel, and Cyprus. He visited famous cities like Istanbul, Jerusalem, Nazareth, Beirut, among others. He includes an extensive chapter on his visit to Cairo, badly affected by the Plague in the year that he visited. Kinglake notes that his host in Cairo died of the Plague after he left the city. This copy is inscribed: "To the Lady Sane, her looks an unworthy gift / from the author". An informative account of the Ottoman Empire, and the changes it affected on several different cultures in the Near East. \$750











