One of the earliest works of epic fantasy, Tolkien's series would go on to help shape the next few generations of modern fantasy writers. 

Marbled endpapers and pastedowns. Illustrated with a frontispiece portrait of Gordon, a full-page map, a folding map, and a few in-text images. With a W. & E. Pickering of Bath bookseller's ticket on the rear pastedown. Very Good. Minor rubbing to the extremities including a small chip to the spine's crown, a later bookplate on the front pastedown. Oxford DNB, Richard Davenport-Hines, "Gordon, Charles George (1833-1885)". General Gordon led an erratic life devoted to warfare, imperialism, and a blend of Victorian and Puritan Christianity. Gordon spurned marriage,


status, and an upper-class lifestyle in favor of military campaigns and success. He defended British interests in China, earning the nickname, "Chinese Gordon", served in the Crimean War, and died trying to hold Khartoum for the British government and their allies in Sudan and Egypt. Gordon was originally supposed to evacuate those in Khartoum fighting for the British, but ended up trying to hold the city against the Mahdi and his army. The journals in this volume span from September to December of 1884, and showcase Gordon's stubborn, cantankerous, self-righteous personality. Gordon did not fear death and saw it as a blessing from God since in his view, all souls were destined for salvation. This was just one of his many extreme beliefs that motivated him to pursue an unconventional lifestyle. After his death, Gordon became a poster child for imperialism and for British interference in the Southern Hemisphere. A divisive figure, Gordon's journals are a first-hand account of his last days, and his frenetic state of mind. \$250









Issues and states for both books and dust jackets are determined by the decisions of publishers and printers (see Bowers and Gaskell). Newbery stickers are produced by the American Library Association, and are independent of a book's publisher and printer. 
James A. Davies, "Forster, John (1812–1876)". This is one of Forster's best-known books. John Forster was a friend and pseudo-literary agent to several influential authors in the nineteenth century: most importantly, he was close with Charles Dickens. It is said that Forster influenced parts of Dickens' writings, and he helped secure copyright protections for Dickens' works. Forster negotiated with Dickens' publishers on the author's pay and other terms of sale. An attractively bound copy of this biography of the witty Irish author Oliver Goldsmith. Goldsmith led a turbulent and varied life, rising from humble beginnings and then pursuing various professions before succedding as an author. All of these misadventures and successes are recorded in Forster's biography. \$400



A war-time map printed on the reverse of the dust jacket, a fascinating feature of this book's publication. Partitioned into three books, with the first discussing the origins of philosophy in Greece and Asia Minor and ending with Plotinus. The second book discusses Jewish ancient philosophy and concludes with the weakening of Catholicism in the fifteenth century, and the final book spans from the Renaissance to Russell's own period: logical positivism and analytic philosophy. One of Rusell's most significant works, and a triumph in the history of philosophy. Bertrand Russell was one of the founders of the school of analytic philosophy and published prolifically throughout his entire life. His History of Philosophy is a critical, expansive guide to the development of philosophy in the Western world over time. \$475






Chemico-Mathematica, 249; Dauben 1361. Todhunter was one of the best-known British mathematicians of the nineteenth century. He was a lecturer in mathematics at Cambridge from 1849 until his death in 1884. Although he made some original contributions to mathematics, his reputation largely rests upon his work in the history of mathematics; he wrote several influential books on the subject, including the present volume. The book was intended to extend the well-known treatment of the history of the calculus by Woodhouse through the middle of the nineteenth century, and includes coverage of the work of Lagrange, Gauss, Poisson, Cauchy, and others. An exceptional copy of this important work in the history of mathematics, with an interesting association and scarce thus. \$1,250





The first edition of Yeats' collected poems was published in 1933, this is a later edition with Yeats' final textual changes. Very Good. Some foxing to the preliminary pages; jacket has minor edge wear and foxing. Includes some publisher's materials: a list of corrections Macmillan made to

this edition of Yeats' poems printed on onion skin, a letter from the publisher to Norman Berg, (Berg was once the Trade Manager of Macmillan's Atlanta branch), with an explanation for the onion skin, and a letter from Berg to Roysce Smith of the Davison-Paxson Company. The letter from the publisher to Berg states that with the corrections (shown on the onion skin) this edition corresponds to the text of the London Limited edition in every respect except for the placement of the poem "Wisdom". A nice jacketed edition of Yeats' work, with ephemera that provides insights into its publishing history. \$150






clipped with toning and edge wear. Oxford DNB, Desmond Lee, "Guthrie, (William) Keith Chambers". William Keith Chambers Guthrie was a most distinguished classicist and historian. In 1956 the heads of Cambridge University Press asked Guthrie to write a comprehensive history of ancient Greek philosophy. Guthrie's series was intended to be five volumes, but he completed six volumes by 1981 (with the sixth covering Aristotle). The ODNB refers to his history as meticulous and captivating: "The History is in fact one of the great works of scholarship of the twentieth century". These volumes are difficult to find in the first edition, particularly Guthrie's first volume. A lovely set of a crucial history of ancient philosophy. \$350
