Elizabeth Gaskell is considered to be one of the pre-eminent writers of Victorian England, with published novels and short stories that criticize industrial society, rigid social hierarchies and constrictive gender roles. Gaskell's female characters often challenged the conventions of the time, and frequently discovered important aspects of who they are and what they're worth through their trials and tribulaboard and spine, gilt lettering on the spines; top edges tions. 

Munch led a troubled, turbulent life and produced the largest part of his oeuvre in the first half of his lifetime. A Norwegian artist, he is said to have been influential on the later German expressionists, and he himself was influenced by Gaugin, Van Gogh, and Toulouse-Lautrec. Upon his death, Munch left thousands of prints, paintings, and drawings in his home. While most people know Munch only for his painting, *The Scream*, this book provides a fabulous overview of his prolific output of sketches and paintings. \$800



The influence of Lewis himself and this book in particular on research in metaphysics over the last 30 years cannot be overstated. According to Wikipedia, the London Chronicle ran from 1756 to 1823 and covered artistic and literary news, along with politics (local and international). It was one of the first newspapers to publish the Declaration of Independence. This volume of the newspaper was released shortly before the end of the Revolutionary War, and features a story on the rebuke of Lord Cornwallis. The volume also has a report on John Adams in his role as a diplomat to France, along with stories of the American Loyalists and their letters and addresses to the King of Britain. Outside of the 13 Colonies, the newspapers bound here contain accounts of Britain's activities in the Carribean islands (including Antigua). \$350



Mary Shelley was the daughter of Mary Wollstonecraft, the pioneering feminist, and Mary Shelley was of course, the author of Frankenstein. These letters detail her travels with her only surviving child, Percy Florence. Mary Shelley would pass away less than ten years after this publication, her final full-length writing. Shelly wrote these letters in-part to raise money to pay off a blackmailer. These works outline Shelley's views on war, culture, history, and political issues of the day. Uncommon in commerce, this is a pleasing set of one of the final works of the revolutionary novelist and progressive Romantic figure. \$500



Philippa Foot is best-remembered for creating "The Trolley Problem", and for reviving interest in Aristotelian virtue-ethics. 




nineteenth century. Jowett made his career translating sections from the New Testament before he undertook Plato's dialogues. After he published his translation of Plato's dialogues in 1871, Jowett published a translation of Aristotle's *Politics*. Other than translation, Jowett dedicated his career to helping undergraduate students afford the cost of college and believed that the tutorial instruction of students was just as important as lecturing. His contemporaries and pupils alike thought of him as the best teacher of classics at Oxford. He regarded his pupils as his friends, and dedicated this work to them. 





fur Mathematik und Physik. The principal result in this work is generally known as Gödel's Incompleteness Theorem which is a proof that any consistent formal system S which includes the standard axioms of arithmetic (as axioms or theorems) is incomplete, that is, there is some proposition P in the system S such that neither P nor its negation is provable in S (in other words, there must be a proposition which is either true or false, but which cannot be proven in S). Kurt Gödel won the first Albert Einstein award in 1951, was awarded the National Medal of Science in 1974, and is regarded as one of the greatest and most influential mathematicians in all of history. A very nice example of Gödel's second book, a milestone in the history of mathematics. \$650







He also advocates strongly for the end of capital and corporal punishment, and believes prison reform ought to be tailored towards a person's mind, not the punishment of their physical body. Finally, this publication drew criticism from the English clergy as the role of the divine is not at all discussed in the natural laws or in the human physiology that Combe outlines in his book. Combe instead offers a secular vision of how the world works and how it could be made better for human beings. \$500
