beautiful copy of Burke's acclaimed novel, nominated for the Pulitzer Prize. **\$500.00**





Philadelphia: David McKay, Publisher [1902]. First edition thus. Large 8vo. 884 pp.; 122 pp. (appendix pagination). The true first edition was published several years earlier in London. Revised and edited with an American appendix by S. Lipschutz, champion of the Manhattan Chess Club of New York. Includes several illustrative diagrams of different game-board scenarios and charts of movement combinations. Pictorial binding with decorations stamped in red and black on the front board and decorations stamped in red and black with gilt on the spine. A Very Good book with an occasional former owner's annotation, a small crack to the rear hinge, and a contemporary owner's name on the free front endpaper (John M Bly). A beautiful, early twentieth century pictorial binding. \$85.00






A Fine book in a Near Fine dust jacket with a few hints of wear to the extremities. A sharp copy of this collection of short pieces. **\$125.00**





A Near Fine book with light shelf -wear to the bottom edges of the boards in a Very Good price-clipped dust jacket with a tiny amount of loss to the tips, and wear to the crown and heel and some mild age toning to the spine panel. A presentable copy of the first edition of this influential collection of essays including "Reference and Modality", "Two Dogmas of Empiricism", and (our personal favorite) the classic "On What There Is". \$200.00








Small 8vo. 222 pp. Bound in dark green cloth with beautiful gilt decorations on the boards and the spine. All edges gilt with dark green pastedowns and endpapers. Illustrated by Richard Heighway. Frontispiece with tissue guard. Fine. Baumgarten 2. Kunitz and Haycraft 324. An exceptional copy of this lovely example of late nineteenth-century trade binding. **\$250.00**




8. Andrews, Roy Chapman. On the Trail of Ancient Man. New York: G.P. Putnam's Sons, 1926. First edition. Large 8vo. 375 pp. Lacks the dust jacket. Includes several black and white photographs of Roy Chapman Andrews' expedition to the Asian Steppe and the Gobi Desert. The photographs depict Andrews' crew members, the fossils he discovered, sketches of how zoologists thought dinosaurs and ancient mammals looked, animals used in the expedition, and other aspects of Andrews' adventures. Volume includes a tissue-guarded frontispiece of Andrews, and a two-page map of Mongolia in the rear. Title page printed in red and black, includes both errata slips. Green cloth with gilt lettering on the front board and spine, top edge gilt. A Very Good book with four small spots of discoloration to the front board and two leaves showing small tears (presumably from a previous owner separating the uncut leaves). Roy Chapman Andrews was a notable inspiration for the character of Indiana Jones, and made several expeditions to the continent of Asia to understand the roots of civilization and to complete humanity's understanding of evolutionary zoology. Jones brought back knowledge of fossils, the Gobi's geology and animal life, and knowledge on the culture of the indigenous peoples (Roy Chapman Andrews Society) (Wisconsin Historical Society). A presentable copy of a first edition of Chapman's book, difficult to find. \$150.00



9. Dylan, Bob (Robert Zimmerman). **Tarantula.** New York: The Macmillan Company [1971]. First edition. 137 pp. Price of \$3.95 on the front flap of the dust jacket. A Near Fine book with a very slight push to the crown of the binding and a former owner's name and date of publication written on the free front endpaper; dust jacket is Very Good with a few tiny chips and tears to the extremities. Dylan's first book, a work of poetry organized in a prose format. A nice copy of the first trade edition. Published during one of Dylan's creative peaks, this book is a wonderful example of the artists' free-form, playful style that he brings to the narration of stories and poetry. **\$250.00**



10. Quine, Willard Van Orman. Word and Object. Boston: The Technology Press (The Massachusetts Institute of Technology) [1960]. First edition. 294 pp. Part of the series "Studies in Communication". A Near Fine book with a former owner's name on the free front endpaper in a Very Good dust jacket with moderate edge wear and two small tape marks on the reverse. W.V.O. Quine was a distinguished philosopher who taught at premier universities like Oxford and Harvard (where he spent the majority of his career). Quine wrote several articles and books that would become staples of philosophy of language and metaphysics curricula. A student of Carnap, Quine worked in the field of analytic philosophy, known for propagating the Verification Theory of Meaning, empiricism and the examination of philosophical problems using scientific principles. Word and Object explores how human language affects ontology and our objective understanding of the world, how words refer to their objects, translation and indeterminacy, language and logic, and more. A lovely copy of a title from one of the most significant philosophers of the twentieth century. \$500.00




11. Homer (Alexander Pope, translator). **The Odyssey of Homer, The Iliad of Homer.** London: Printed by Charles Rivington, 1760. Later edition. 8vo. 11 volumes. [iv-xli], 240 pp.; 272 pp.; 316 pp.; 277 pp.; 280 pp. [19], [28].; 175 pp.; 189 pp.; 304 pp.; 301 pp.; 287 pp.; 212 pp., [76]. The set is illustrated with numerous wood-cut head and tailpieces (each new book of the poems is accompanied by a half-title with a head and tail-piece). At the beginning of each new book of the poem a miniature wood-cut illustrates the page, and at the end of several of the books a woodcut illustration is also included. The miniature wood-cuts include illustrations of famous figures and scenes in myth like Scylla, Odysseus and the suitors, Odysseus and Laertes, Athena, Achilles and Agamemnon, the *Doloneia*, and more. Volume one of the *Iliad* includes two plates as the frontispiece, a wood-engraving of the bust of Homer which resided in Farnese Gardens (located on the north of the Palatine Hill in Rome) and a copper-engraving of Alexander Pope surrounded by a decorative wood engraving, sculptor is credited as Miller at the bottom of the plate. In the rear of Volume one of the *Iliad* are two folding plates and one folding map. The map is of Homeric Greece and Troy, a beautiful copper-engraving. The other two folding plates are copper -engravings of Achilles' shield (with the different sections labeled) and an illustration of Troy and its environs, with the Scamander river depicted and an ancient fleet of warships depicted as drawing up to the Phrygian coastline. Volume one of the *Odyssey* includes an essay "A General View of the Epick Poem, and of the *Iliad* and the *Odyssey*, extracted from Bossu". Volume five of the Odyssey includes a general index and Homer's Battle between Frogs and Mice, translated by Archdeacon Thomas Parnel and corrected by Pope.







The *Iliad*'s volume one includes an essay on the life of Homer and a geographical table of Troy. Volume six of the *Iliad* includes a general index, a poetical index explaining the story of the *Iliad*, an index of characters, an index of similes (categorizing similes down to the animals used in the comparison), a geographical index, and an index of arts and sciences, pointing out where processes like prophecy and navigation are used within the poem. Before each book of the poem Pope includes an "argument" or a summary of the book and where the main characters are at in the story. Volumes are uniformly bound in contemporary full calf with gilt tooling on the edges of the boards, marbled edges, and beautiful, contemporary blue and white endpapers. Each volume also includes a lovely, thin blue-ribbon as a bookmark. Each spine is in six compartments, with gilt tooling as decoration and an unpolished calf label with the title of the poem and the volume number. Each volume has a small label on its front pastedown from a former owner (Hauptnummer, likely a late eighteenth-century collector), with each label numbered as a volume in his or her library. Volume one of the *Iliad* has an old bookseller's label on the free endpaper (Charles Schambourg of Vienna, a French bookseller and printer who worked in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth century). A Near Fine set with some very minor foxing to a few leaves in two of the volumes, spines show minor spots of wear, tiny puncture to the front board of volume five of the *Odyssey* affecting the first three leaves, and a few tiny dark spots from a former owner's label on the bottom of the spines (but unobtrusive and hardly affecting their appearance). This edition is a 1760 reprint of the 1715-20, 1725-26 edition of Pope's famous (and what is arguably the most poetic), translation. Young 203. The *Iliad* and the *Odyssey* are foundations of western literature, with a vast amount of scholarship done on the poems. Both the *Iliad* and the Odyssey continue to be taught in literature and Greek courses around the world. Homer's work offers literary and historical insights on life in the bronze and archaic ages of ancient Greece and Asia minor as well as insights into war and the nature of humanity. A beautiful, finely bound example of two the greatest poems ever written. \$4,000.00





First printing of the Purple House Press edition, published 40 years after the first Mad Scientist's Club story appeared in Boy's Life magazine. The first hardcover edition of this book is genuinely scarce and the beautifully produced Purple House Press edition is the next best thing for those who grew up with these wonderful stories which inspired countless boys to pursue careers in science and engineering. **\$50.00**



Second issue of the first American edition, as per Green and Gibson (although in our opinion better described as the second American edition). Near Fine with a couple of tiny areas of red discoloration to the top edge of the front board and a bit of darkening to the textblock. Green and Gibson A14c. An attractive copy of the fourth Sherlock Holmes book, and the second collection of Sherlock Holmes short stories. \$300.00










Price of \$3.95 on front flap of jacket. A Very Good book with the usual darkening to the leaves, slight lean due to a bit of separation between the backstrip and the top textblock, and light wear to the edges of the boards in a Near Fine dust jacket with a few hints of wear to the extremities. A presentable copy of this omnibus which is the first hardcover American edition of Cop Hater, The Mugger, and The Pusher (first published in paperback in the US and hardcover in the UK). \$150.00




18. Robb, Alfred A. **A Theory of Time and Space.** Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 1914. First edition. Octavo. 373 pp. Bound in navy blue cloth with gold lettering and publisher's device in gold on the spine, double-ruled blind-stamped border to both boards. Inscribed "To the Rev. G. A. Weekes with the author's compliments" on the free front endpaper (without signature). Ownership signature of astronomer K. C. Westfold (dated January 1954) below the presentation. George Arthur Weekes was a colleague of Robb's at Cambridge and he died in June 1953 (London Times, 24 June 1953). Presumably Westfold acquired the book shortly thereafter while a student at Oxford. A Very Good book with light wear to the crown and heel of the spine, rubbing and light wear to the extremities, minor wrinkling to the cloth on the top corner of the front board. A very presentable copy of Robb's best-known book, with very interesting historical associations. Robb's book is significant largely for introducing an axiomatic formulation of special relativity using the novel idea that a spacetime point is in the future of another just in case it is in the forward light cone of that point, . **\$650.00**








Illustrations drawn and engraved on wood by Rudolph Ruzicka. Includes 14 full-page illustrations of the different fountains in Rome (including the Trevi and Monte Cavallo), and the errata slip. A Near Fine book with a few hints of wear to the extremities and a small tear to one leaf. A fascinating turn-of-the-century publisher's binding with wonderful illustrations depicting the fountains of Rome. **\$75.00**







First edition. 201 pp. Bound in navy blue cloth with gold lettering and publisher's device in gold on the spine, double-rules blind-stamped to the top and bottom of spine, double-ruled blind-stamped border to both boards. A Very Good book with light wear to the crown and heel of the spine, rubbing and light wear to the extremities, previous owner's name written on front pastedown and stamped on front endpaper and half-title page. Russell was one of the principal founders of analytic philosophy and one of the 20th centuries most important thinkers in philosophy of language, logic, and philosophy of mathematics. Russell won the Nobel Prize and was also well-known as a pacifist and an advocate for numerous progressive causes. Blackwell & Ruja A3.1a. 




Black and white frontispiece of George Washington with tissue guard, 18 additional plates (1 color illustration, 7 color maps, 10 in black and white with tissue guards) in volume 1 along with numerous illustrations throughout the text (some full page) and a black and white map on pp 236-237 (numerous other smaller maps). Black and white frontispiece of William Pitt with tissue guard, 16 additional plates (6 color maps, 10 in black and white with tissue guards) in volume 2 along with numerous illustrations throughout the text (some full page) and 4 fullpage black and white maps (with several other smaller maps). 

Second edition. 8vo. 2 volumes. 356 pp.; 351 pp. Modern three-quarter brown calf over marbled paper, spine in six compartments with gilt lettering and gilt rules, decorations and rules stamped in blind on the spine, new endpapers and pastedowns, brown topstain and red decorative speckling to fore-edge and bottom edge. Volume 1 missing the A4 blank (the blank leaf called for between the errata and the contents has been excised), otherwise both volumes collate complete. Keynes A17. Bindings are about Fine, contents Near Fine, leaves very clean with occasional light wear (Volume 1: bottom corner of L1 missing; Volume 2: minor damage to bottom of A1 through B1 (presumably from a small piece of debris that lay there for many decades), similar flaw to the bottom of the Aa gathering). 



A very near Fine book with faint offsetting to the first free front endpaper. Ruth S. Farnam served as an army nurse during WWI, and served as a soldier for the Serbian Army. She is the only known American woman to do so, and received three commendations from the Serbian King (Serbica Americana, Ruth Stanley Farnam). Enser 268. A beautiful copy of this autobiography, a fascinating tale of bravery and sacrifice from an American woman. **\$85.00**



First edition. 8vo. 2 volumes. 528 pp.; 483 pp. Finely bound in recent green Morocco over green cloth bordered with twin gilt rules, spine in six compartments bordered by twin gilt rules, black leather labels with gilt lettering, recent marbled endpapers and pastedowns. Engraved frontispiece in volume 1 with 23 additional woodengraved plates, numerous smaller illustrations, large folding color map in the rear pocket (with a few tears and a split along the fold), and three additional folding maps. Photogravure frontispiece with tissue guard in volume 2 with 18 additional wood-engraved plates (note that p. 163 is a full page illustration, not a plate, but is often counted as such; all plates

called for are present), numerous smaller illustrations, and a large color folding map in the rear pocket (with a few tiny tears). Bindings are Fine with a tiny bump to the top corner of the board on volume 1, interiors are Very Good with some mild age-toning and scattered tears, but the leaves and plates are generally very clean. A detailed account of Stanley's expedition on the Congo River from 1879 - 1884 and his work to establish the Congo Free State on behalf of King Leopold II of Belgium (there is much recent scholarship on Stanley's views and approach to his work versus those of Leopold; see Jeal, Stanley: *The Impossible Life of Africa's Greatest Explorer* for many new and interesting discoveries). An attractive set of this essential work in the history of Central Africa and the Congo Basin. **\$1,250.00**


