A stunning copy of Thompson's best known book, the story of a drug and booze-fueled road trip by the author and his "Samoan" attorney from California to Las Vegas. Thompson originally set out to complete a piece on sports journalism, but ended up producing a story on the seedy underbelly of Vegas, and a first-person narrative of the different places where drug use took him and his companion, Zeta-Acosta. \$1,750












CHAPTER II




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

A facsimile of the third J.M. Dent edition. First published by William Caxton in 1485, the much-later J.M. Dent edition aimed to preserve much of the sensibility of Caxton's publication. A beautiful production by the Folio Society. 1,000 copies were produced for sale, this is copy #925 according to the limitation page. Malory's *King Arthur* is a cornerstone work in Arthurian mythology and in literary folklore. Please note this is a large book and may require extra shipping. \$700











reproduced via digital photography. Each leaf is bright and colorful in the folio volume. Fine. Nash 1313. One of 1480 copies produced for sale. The Luttrell Psalter was created sometime between 1320 and 1345, and its production was funded by Sir Geoffrey Luttrell. A British noble from Lincolnshire, the psalter's patron felt pressure to commission the manuscript as his health was failing. The gothic script and the hybrid creatures within the margins make the work an eye-catching, beautiful representation of medieval art and culture. The work is also decorated with scenes of rural life in England prior to the Black Plague. A fascinating glimpse into medieval religion, politics, and the medival imagination. Please note, this item is quite large and may require extra postage. \$1,000

The letter is addressed to a Mrs. Smiley and thanks her for sending Crane a bottle of maple syrup. Crane lived in Taos at the time and states how hard it is to come by maple syrup in her town. She also discusses how she used the maple syrup, particularly how she used it in mixing cocktails for herself. \$150










A slight lean, foxing to the pageblock. A contemporary name on the free front endpaper, Afro-Americana 7210. Sabin H55847. A gut-wrenching depiction of American slavery: the author was lured to Washington D.C., drugged, and then kidnapped. His attackers sold him into slavery in New Orleans, and it would be years before Northup received legal assistance to return home to his property in New York state. His enslaver never received justice, as the District of Columbia did not allow Black people to testify against white people. The true first edition is difficult to find in commerce. This is dated the same year as the first edition, but is a later printing (as stated on the title page). \$500











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

























Leary was a professor at Harvard but was expelled after involving undergraduate and graduate students in his experiments with LSD. He was a cornerstone figure in the American Counterculture movement, and Leary advocated for the use of psilocybin to expand the mind's consciousness. \$450







contemporary inscription which states: "A.C. Clausen, St. John's College, Oxford. Bought Feb 13th. 1891: original price 7/6, but 10/- paid for this copy as it was one of the last copies of the edition, one of the few "editiones principes" of modern times.". The inscription provides an insight into book prices at the turn of the century in London. According to the preface of the plate volume, this second edition of the plate volume has additional photographs. The British Museum, "The Constitution of the Athenians". Aristotle's pupils at his school recorded the constitutions of 158 Greek city-states. These documents helped Aristotle write his work, Politics, but sadly none survive except for the Athenian constitution. Our record of this constitution (dated to ca. 100 CE) was discovered in the nineteenth century, on four papyrus scrolls. These papyri greatly inform our understanding of how Athenian democracy and politics worked. E.A. Wallis Budge, famous for producing the facsimiles of the Egyptian Book of the Dead, was responsible for these papyri making their way to the British museum. The plate volume is difficult to find in commerce. \$1,500

Like the work of writers such as Alan Watts, Herrigel's publication brought several principles of Eastern philosophy to a Western readership. The author studied archery in Japan for several years before writing this book. \$375
