With a contemporary bookseller and stationer stamp of Portsmouth, VA on the free front endpaper. Xenophon's history of the Greek alliance between ten thousand hoplites and Cyrus, the younger son of Darius II who aimed to usurp the throne from his brother, Artaxerxes II. These events would foreshadow the campaigns of Alexander the Great against the Persian empire. The translator, Charles Anthon, is best remembered for his work on translating the Mormon's Golden Plates. \$150



Written by a respected Chinese historian and philosopher, these volumes contain analysis of Confucius, Lao-Tzu, the Mohist school, philosophy before Confucius, Neo-Confucianism, Buddhism, philosophy during the Han dynasty, and more. \$650





Lowndes 883. A collection of short stories and parables likely written and gathered by a priest around 1300 A.C.E. according to the available historical evidence. An anthology of didactic literature, with stories that most modern readers consider to be macabre and highly unsettling. However, there is a consensus among scholars that these stories inspired Boccaccio, Shakespeare, and other later works of classic literature. Swan's translation was frequently reprinted, and makes the medieval text accessible to English readers. \$250



Buckley's book provides a historical account of the state of the ruins of Greco-Roman Antiquity and the Levant in the late nineteenth century as well as an account of the contemporary residents of these places. This book includes plates of the Sphinx, the Duomo, the Dead Sea, the Jordan, the Pyramids, the Cathedral of Milan, the Acropolis, Corinth, Tangier, the Bosporus, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, and much more. The plates reflect what the greatest sights of these places looked like in the late nineteenth century. \$100
