Each front wrapper of the facsimile volumes with a colorful illustration. All the facsimile volumes housed in a grey cloth slipcase with a navy label lettered in white on one side. The commentary volume lettered in white on the front board and spine, a green ribbon bookmark bound in, the commentary volume housed in a navy slipcase. Each of the twelve volumes with black and white and colorful illustrations throughout. The commentary volume also with colorful illustrations. Fine. This Facsimile edition was done in collaboration with the Royal Geographical Society, the British Library, and the Scott Polar Institute, to honor the centenary of the death of Scott and his crew. Royal Collection Trust, "The South Polar Times, 1903". The South Polar Times was a newspaper produced by Scott's crew in an effort to stave off the boredom that came from expoloration and scientific observation. The publication contained both scholarly articles and humorous pieces, with illustrations (mostly by Edward Wilson) to accompany the text. 1000 copies of this set were produced, this is number 325. This is a large and







The clamshell measures 24" by 17". This is a facsimile reproduction of the Queen Mary Atlas, which was first produced and issued in the mid-sixteenth century. Commissioned by Queen Mary I as a gift for her husband (and cousin) King Philip II, Queen Mary died before the atlas could be given to her husband. Queen Elizabeth I, Mary's rival and successor, was the actual recipient of the atlas. The atlas remains in the British Library, whose cooperation was essential in reproducing both the rectos and versos of the maps in the original atlas. The maps in the elephant folio are bright and colorful, and show different views of all five continents. Please note, this item is quite large and will require extra postage. \$950








Austen's home, Salisbury Cathedral, York Minster, the Isle of Skye, Inverness, Grasmere Lake, Thomas Hardy's birthplace in Dorset, landmarks from his novel Tess of the D'Urbervilles, Westminster Abbey, Samuel Johnson's home in London, an orator speaking in Hyde Park, Dickens' residence, the Tower of London, Kensington Gardens, and the exterior of the British Museum. The album was put together by an English literature professor who took the trip and let his love of the subject inform his itinerary. The postcards at the end of the album depict the Brontë sisters, Byron, Wordsworth, Dickens, and others. Most of the photographs are of just the landmarks, but there are a few photographs of people scattered throughout: the crowd listening to the speaker at Hyde Park, a women playing with a shetland pony on the side of the highway, a man standing in the circle at Stonehenge (possibly the compiler of this album), and women shopping at the Shambles in York. 






One of the brochures discusses Byzantine Greece (Greece and Macedonia together), another is a map for those who want to road trip across Greece (the itinerary covers Igoumenitsa to Athens). The road trip brochure also has suggestions for hotels, car ferries, and for tourism destinations on the route from Igoumenitsa to Athens. The brochures are printed on brightly colored paper and provide an index of interesting landmarks for tourists eager to learn more about which ruins, museums, and art pieces one should visit in Greece. \$125




with only the first and last couplets printed: "In what order should these be ranged? From the point of view of publishing procedure (though without any authority) I suggest the most likely sequence to have been as follows (a) Private, with incomplete Ballad; (b) Public, ditto ... ". Volume three contains a biography of Barham. The Ingoldsby Legends were far and away Barham's most successful publication. Barham was an English clergyman, humorist, and writer. Kunitz refers to Barham's writings and Barham himself as "unmistakably Kentish". Some of the ghost stories contained in the First Series are said to be from a Mrs. Hughes, an enormous influence on Barham's career. She pushed him to complete and publish his first novel, My Cousin Nicholas. The Ingoldsby stories were first published in Bentley's Miscellany, a magazine, in the late 1830s. They were edited by Charles Dickens. Richard Bentley, a friend of Barham, decided to release them in book form. Barham's series contains ghost stories, short literary prose, a poem grieving the death of his son, and general parodies of English life. Though largely popular, Barham's work was sometimes criticized for its parody of the Pope and Catholic doctrine. An avid drinker and cat lover (only writing when a cat attended him), Barham is remembered largely for The Ingoldsby Legends (a work once so popular, an average schoolboy would have passages memorized). Cuvier", on the third leaf of text. This is likely the ownership stamp of Georges Cuvier, the famed zoologist and anatomist. Cuvier was a pioneering researcher in the field of vertebrate zoology. His work helped shed light on the process of species extinction, and illuminated certain aspects of evolutionary biology. Cuvier worked on fossils of giant ground sloths, pterodactyls, mastodons, and other animals. The author, Ernst Weber, and Cuvier were contemporaries. Weber himself was an accomplished scientist, conducting revolutionary experiments in physiology (especially on blood flow and the physics of it) and in chemistry. Weber's work in anatomy helped scientists understand the origin of different fluids in the human body. The author's work also helped advance human knowledge of fish and avian anatomy. Scarce in commerce, this is a fascinating association copy. \$450
